Almshouses in Kilkenny

Kilkenny City had many Almshouses to care for the poor - the oldest of these is the Shee Alms House on Mary's Lane, one of the few surviving Tudor Almshouses in Ireland, established in 1582. They were open to "All poor persons, resident in the city of Kilkenny who are desirous to have the Scriptures read for them." Other Almshouses include Switzers/St. James Asylum built in 1803 apparently with stone left over from building the James Stephens Military Barracks, and Evans Home, now restored as the new Butler Gallery.

St. Mary's Almshouses

St. Mary's Almshouses are located in the centre of Kilkenny in St. Mary's churchyard. They consist of a pair of semi-detached almshouses each of which was originally designed to house 6 women, distressed widows, one to each room. Both buildings are in the ownership of Kilkenny County Council having been purchased from The Church of Ireland in 2010 as part of the redevelopment of the church & graveyard for public use. In recent memory, one of the Almhouses, No 1 St. Marys Place was used as the residence of the caretaker for St. Marys Church. The last resident was Mrs Eileen Bibby who was caretaker of St. Mary's Parish Hall for over 70 years, and raised her family there.

History of the Structure

St. Mary's Almshouse was built in the early 19th century by the Rev. Peter Roe who was at the time a curate at St. Mary's Church. Funds were raised by subscription of 3d per week, by donations and charity sermons. It was originally established in 1803 in Lee's Lane, which is now Abbey Street, using an existing rented building as Lee's Lane Poor House. It was later moved to the new purpose-built buildings in St. Mary's Churchyard around 1820. It was established as the Peter Roe Trust for the relief of distressed widows.


The buildings appear to be shown first on the first OS map c.1839. The layout of each building with six virtually identical rooms also supports the suggestion that it was purpose-built as an almshouse.

At the same time, on the other side of the River Nore Evans' Asylum or Home was being built from the funds left by Joseph Evans who died in 1818. It is notable that the fireplaces in Evans' Home are very similar to those in St. Mary's, but Evans' seem cruder, possibly they were the prototypes for St. Mary's.

Protecting Built Heritage

St. Mary's Almshouse in Kilkenny City retains much of its early fabric which is a valuable economic & tourism resource. By preserving characteristic features of the City, Kilkenny County Council & Kilkenny Civic Trust seeks to maintain and nurture its environment and cultural heritage as part of its identity. Kilkenny County Council has a proud record in protecting its built heritage with several successful examples of the adaptive reuse of historic buildings such as neighbouring St. Mary's Church completed in 2017 and now housing the Medieval Mile Museum and more recently, Evans' Home, completed in 2020 the new home for the Butler Gallery. These projects successfully demonstrate how sensitive restoration can give a new lease of life to historic buildings and it is hoped to apply the same care and experience to the restoration of St. Mary's Almshouses.







Kilkenny Catwalk Art Trail





THE CAT THAT GOT THE CREAM

CREATED BY: EAMON COLMAN

Eamon Colman was born in Dublin in 1957. He is an elected member of Aosdána since 2007 in recognition of his major contribution to Irish culture.

His professional career spans from 1979, having created nearly forty solo exhibitions presented nationally and internationally. In 1997, he was invited to host a major mid-term retrospective exhibition of his work entitled 'Post Cards Home' at the Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin at the age of 39 years. This was accompanied by a monograph on his work by writer and art critic Brian Mc Avera entitled 'Dreams from The Lion's Head, The Work of Eamon Colman' published by Four Fields Press.

A 25-year retrospective of his work is featured in a substantial publication by Gandon Editions, Kinsale: 'Profile 25 – Eamon Colman' (2006). In 1989, he won the First Prize Painting Award in EVA International; in 2001 First Prize Painting Award in Eigse, Carlow Arts Festival; in 2002, he was the first Irish artist to be awarded Full Fellowship Award from the Vermont Studio Centre, USA; in 2005, he won a CCAT Interreg Major Award for touring an exhibition in Wales, UK and in 2018 he was awarded a Culture Ireland GB18 Award. His work has been included in exhibitions representing contemporary Irish art in Brussels, Denmark, France, Spain, UK, Hong Kong, Canada, and USA. His work can be viewed in his representative gallery: Solomon Fine Art, Balfe Street, Dublin 2.









THE AGE-FRIENDLY CAT

CREATED BY: PAUL BOKSLAG & ASSOCIATES

The Age Friendly Cat was painted by Paul Bokslag following a series of online workshops promoted by the Older Peoples Council.

Through the medium of papercutting, participants explored positive and negative space, colour, pattern and all things Kilkenny. The rich collection of papercuts that developed over a couple of months, became an integral part of the cat design.

Early on, one of the workshop participants proposed that the Age Friendly Cat should be a celebration of creativity in older age.

Paul Bokslag is a visual artist and designer from the Netherlands, based in Callan, Co. Kilkenny. He was a co-founder of KCAT Arts Centre and has worked as a Creative Associate for Helium Arts.

Paul works across a range of media, from drawing, painting, printmaking, papercutting, photography and type design to sculpture and site specific installations. His solo exhibitions include 'Waking Up in Waterford' with Waterford Healing Arts Trust (2014) and 'Rock, Paper, Scissors' at Garter Lane Arts Centre (2012) and he has taken part in a large number of group shows.

Paul has been on residencies at the Tyrone Guthrie Centre and Cill Rialaig Artist Retreat. He was a recipient of the 2011 'Healthway International Arts and Health Fellowship' with DADAA in Fremantle, Western Australia. He was the artist-in-residence for 'The Breadwinner' exhibition at the Butler Gallery in Kilkenny and he collaborated on a number of projects with Workhouse Union.

Paul has completed large scale papercut installations, room filling tape drawings and twine sculptures spanning multiple floors in Temple Bar Gallery, Dublin; National Design and Craft Gallery, Kilkenny; Luan Gallery, Athlone; VISUAL, Carlow and County Hall, Kilkenny. In 2019 Paul was commissioned by the Facebook AIR Program to make a large mural for their new offices in Ballsbridge, Dublin.

NINE THOUSAND BABIES

CREATED BY: ELIZABETH COPE

The cat painting came about as the nucleus for the Magdalen Laundry (9,000 Babies? Exhibition) It has a drawing of a view in being inside the laundry with girls washing sheets at big vats which I witnessed when I was able to get inside the laundry when I was a pupil at the Convent of Mercy in Athy about 1965. I add other animals, birds, fish and a selection of things that I paint. Life goes on, cruelty goes on and some good things go on. When are we ever going to be civilized?

Irish Artist Elizabeth Cope was born in 1952 in Co. Kildare. She currently lives and works in Co. Kilkenny. Cope has exhibited in galleries and museums all over the world for the past 40 years and is found in many important public and private collections.

"Painting for me is a way of life. I was seduced by the smell of oil paint when I was nine years old: my sister came home from Paris with a box of paints.

The act of painting is like doing a post mortem. You are involved emotionally and yet detached at the same time. This means that the act of painting is dispassionate as well as passionate. I think that the painter has 'an inner eye'. When I was a child I wanted to be a nun and become a saint, like St. Therese of Lisieux. I soon realized that this would not happen, but perhaps becoming a painter has allowed me to become a 'second-rate saint'. The dedication of a painter allows a spiritual freedom and I see painting as a kind of prayer that lifts the spirit beyond mundane life.

Like many of the artists I admire I begin with a struggle. Without the struggle occurring in making a painting, I feel that the process of trying to paint is not wholly alive. It is the struggle that counts. In painting there is no resolution; it is an ongoing act.

I paint through the chaos of everyday life, if I were to wait for a quiet moment I would never paint. I believe that painting should also be like dancing and that the real 'work of art' is not so much the canvas when the paint is dry, but rather the physical rhythm of the process of painting it."









VOODOO

I'll only say the simple facts of the making of the voodoo cat. I wanted to drastically change the look of the cat-form. But I was never going to apply enough skewers to do that totally..so a ghost cat remained below. Making it was simply barbecue skewers put into pre drilled holes in the plastic cat and held in place by a drip of wood glue. The Voodoo name is of course borrowed from African and Caribbean magical figurines covered in nails and other sharp things. I actually don't like any cats smaller than a bobcat or lynx. I'm a dog man. But I'd be much more interested in other people's responses and interpretations of what this porcupiney cat is about. Thank you!



SHADOW SIDE

Shadow Side By Orla de Bri was inspired by the Pangur Bán Character in 'The Secret of Kells' film by Cartoon Saloon

He is a shape shifter and becomes a blue colour at night, so I painted him as a midnight sky, I saw his eyes as orbiting planets and his tail swirls like a galaxy. He silently moves in the shadows and steals a key. In daytime he is surrounded by trees and insects, so I sculpted the pointed bees and a rotund beetle.

To remind us "we are only alive for a short time, there is nothing in this life but mist" - Quote from The Secret of Kells.

Orla was born in Ireland and works from her studio in Co Meath. de Brí works in bronze, steel and fiberglass. She has had seven Solo Shows, and has completed 26 site-specific, large-scale public sculptures, in Ireland, London and Istanbul.

Working in both Gallery and Public Art her work is in many significant public and private collections both nationally and internationally.

In the last 6 years she was commissioned to create a 7meter sculpture for the Sabanci Collection in Istanbul, a 8.5 meter site-specific piece for The University of Limerick and has completed a sculpture for the roof of Bevelly Castle consisting of a 3-meter human figure and a 5-meter 24ct gold leaf tree, This is situated at the entrance to the Great Island, Cobh, Co Cork.

Orla's work is predominately figurative, the figures are highly stylized and usually appear with an abstract shape or an element from nature. She is curious about human behaviour and how we development and change over time. How we analyse ourselves, relate to other people, and how we connect with our surroundings is central to my work.

The process of making a sculpture is something Orla really enjoys; beginning with a thought or a feeling then a drawing, followed by the physical aspect of constructing the piece.

Orla likes playing with and exploring different materials, combining elements that may seem incompatible at first, but yet express something in the piece. And during this process you lose time and feel very much part of the work, almost like a meditation.









CATS DON'T SWIM

CREATED BY: BERNADETTE KIELY

'A lot of my work over the past 20 years has been related to the life of the river Nore and its banks where I live and work. While I really like the poem and the sentiment of the Irish Monk as he connects his creativity with that of his cat Pangur Ban, my inspiration came from my focus on environmental change and my first thought when I saw the cat was 'cats don't swim'. Rising waters due to rapid climate change affects us all including cats, who, while they have the ability to stay afloat and swim, often avoid water as they do not have enough body fat or hair to protect them from the cold. I have attempted to paint the cat as if he/she is sinking in water. The paint and texture reflects the colour of river water in flood as the soil is displaced from the riverbed'.

Bernadette Kiely is a visual artist based in Thomastown, County Kilkenny, Ireland. She graduated from the College of Art and Design, Waterford I.T. with first class honours in Graphic Design Communications and worked for two years in Graphic Design in London and Architecture in New York before attending the Slade School of Fine Art, University of London, UK.

Her most recent exhibition '...one touch of nature makes the whole world kin...' was shown at Taylor Galleries, Dublin, May – July 2020. Her largescale paintings and drawings have been exhibited in solo exhibitions at The Butler Gallery, Kilkenny, Solstice Arts Centre, Navan, The Source Arts Centre, Thurles, LUAN Gallery, Athlone, Ballina Arts Centre, Co. Mayo, Model Gallery, Sligo, Millennium Court Arts Centre, Portadown, Co. Armagh, N. Ireland, Imagine Arts Festival, Waterford, Kilkenny Arts Festival, Skive Kunstmuseum, Skive, Denmark and in group exhibitions at The Royal Academy, London, UK, Irish Museum of Modern Art, Dublin, The Royal Hibernian Academy, Dublin, The Royal Ulster Academy, Belfast, N. Ireland, Douglas Hyde Gallery, Dublin, Boyle Arts Festival, Roscommon, The American Irish Historical Society, New York, USA.

She was elected to the membership of Aosdana. in 2007. Studio residencies include the RHA Schools in 2015, Ballinglen Arts Foundation, Co. Mayo, Tyrone Guthrie Centre, Co. Monaghan and Cill Rialaig Artists retreat Centre, Co. Kerry.

Bernadette's work is held in public and private collections in Ireland, UK, Europe, USA and Korea. She is represented in Ireland by Taylor Galleries, 16, Kildare Street, Dublin.









BLACK CAT

CREATED BY: STEVEN AYLIN

My method is very simple. Often I draw on found objects, scraps of paper, offcuts of wood, old floorboards, broken records. Using paid, print and drawing techniques I put images on a variety of surfaces using whatever I can get my hands on. Frequently work is destroyed or worked over completely. The pleasure comes from the doing, the working, of repetitious marks being made.

First I sprayed the whole thing black as I wasn't keen on the original colour for a background. Next, I simply started drawing on it, making lines shapes and patterns and doodling into the spaces created. Using pens and paint I worked quickly and intuitively. Initially I had no intention of symmetry but once the initial areas and lines had been drawn it became a curious prospect. Ideally I would have worked for much longer on the surface building it up, layering it, and sanding back etc. The tail section had about 5 or 6 different layers or possible outcomes, but each in turn aids the creation of the result. The cat is not so much finished, more that work stopped.

With a background in Arts Education and gallery work, originally from Warrington in the UK Steven now resides in Kilkenny working as a freelance illustrator, designer and gallery technician.

I draw most days, it helps. It is a constant, a necessity, a chance to indulge and revel in the solitude it provides. Often I draw on found objects, scraps of paper, offcuts of wood, old floorboards, broken records. Using paid, print and drawing techniques I put images on a variety of surfaces using whatever I can get my hands on. Frequently work is destroyed or worked over completely. The pleasure comes from the doing, the working on a surface, of repetitious marks being made.

Occasionally when I finish a set or body of work I will exhibit, in groups or on my own, sometimes in England, sometimes in Ireland, sometimes elsewhere.









PANGUR BÁN OVERWHELMED BY PANDEMIC OF MICE

I had always thought that Pangur Bán was somewhat self-satisfied and when the opportunity arose to test my imagination, I decided to infest him with a plague of mice. This idea was analogous to the pandemic which occurred in 2020 where the human race was threatened with possible extinction.

Irish sculptor John Behan studied at Ealing Art College, London, and the Royal Academy School, Oslo. Behan's figurative sculptures in bronze, combine ancient culture and mythology with modern technique. John was a night student at the NCAD in Dublin 1956-60.

He was a founder member of the New Artists' group in 1962, the Project Art Centre in 1967, and the Dublin Foundry in 1970. Behan has exhibited nationally and internationally and completed major public commissions in Mayo, Donegal, Galway, and Dublin. Behan is known for his remarkable and numerous public sculptures, such as the vast 'National Famine Memorial' in County Mayo (26 x 20ft) or 'Arrival' (21 x 24ft) sited at the United Nations building in New York.

His work is included in many private collections including that of Mary McAleese, Mary Robinson, Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands and Bill and Hillary Clinton, also Dublin City Gallery, He is an elected member of the RHA and Aosdána.

MARMALADE MOUNTAIN

"I want to conquer the Pangur Ban mountain, literally. I transformed it, the best I could into a wild sculpture, mountainous monument. I wanted people to get lost in it."

The year is 3300AD. After the fall of humanity in the great cataclysm the world is entirely occupied by Cats. Well not entirely. One tiny group of indomitable rebel Mice hold out against them. Stumbling upon a bunker full of ancient human technology and DVDs they have built CAT-AT walkers to infiltrate the Cat battalions surrounding their underground city to strike a decisive blow in the eternal struggle of cat and mouse. Blaise Smith RHA also has a show of his paintings in the Butler Gallery until November 14th. There are no mice in it.

Blaise Smith R.H.A. (b.1967) lives in County Kilkenny and is one of Ireland's leading Figurative painters. He is adept at Landscapes, Portraits and Still life.

He has exhibited in the National Gallery of Ireland in the landscape exhibition Shaping Ireland and his portrait "My Parents" was runner up in the National Gallery's Zurich Portrait Prize in 2019.

He won the Irish Arts Review Portrait Prize with his much celebrated group portrait "8 Scientists", a portrait of leading Irish female Scientists for the Royal Irish Academy and Accenture's "Women on Walls" Campaign. He recently completed another WOW portrait for DCU of the Engineer Beatrice Alice Hicks. Other recent public portraits are of Dean William Morton for St. Patricks Cathedral, Dean Mary McCarron for TCD and the playwright Bernard Farrell for the Abbey.

During his career he has completed several large scale State commissions: most recently a 5 metre panorama of Waterford City in 2016 and - SCHOOLWORK - twenty paintings portraying life in a Carlow School in 2011.


He has had numerous solo shows and his work is held in many Public and Private Collections and exhibits every year in the RHA Annual Exhibition.


He likes to paint birds, flowers and superheroes and sometimes all together.

PANGUR A LÂN

The cat I have painted has . The Kilkenny Team colours on its striped tail .

He also has a rainbow tie to be all-inclusive , his fur is grey to represent the older community ,

His eyes reflect light at night as a nod to road safety . He is called Pangur A Lán [a lot] .

The contemporary Irish abstract painter Francis Tansey was born in Dublin in 1959 and has been one of the most popular Irish artists over the last two decades.

He studied at the National College of Art and Design in (1978-1983) specializing in abstract art and in 1985 he became the first Artist in Residence, at The Butler Gallery, Co. Kilkenny, where his brightly coloured geometric acrylic painting's caused great interest. Tansey's unique distillation and interpretation of Colourism, gained him immediate recognition worldwide and particularly in Ireland. He first rose to prominence with his inclusion in R.O.S.C. in 1988 as the youngest artist ever to have exhibited in this prestigious International Exhibition.









PANGUR DUBH

My first impulse on hearing of the project was to wrap this cat, have an Egyptian mummy, I was disappointed to learn that this would not be possible as the bandages would not have been waterproof and to waterproof it would not have worked.

So Pangúr Dubh it is.....a Kilkenny cat. Materials Black pigment with pva. Graphite with pva All covered with acrylic varnish.

Helen Comerford has been a professional artist since the early seventies. She has always been involved in art activities and was a member of the board of the AAI, Wexford Arts Centre and Garter Lane Arts Centre. Her involvement in education include lecturing in DLSAD and UCD. She was an innovator in special needs education and was one of the initiators of Kcat arts centre and was the initiator of the slate quarries symposium.

She was born in Thomastown co. Kilkenny and received her art education in Dublin, Belfast and Utrecht. Helen Comerford has been with Taylor Galleries since 1979 and had her first solo exhibition there in 1980. She has had many solo shows there since then and has shown in the Summer and Christmas gallery artists shows constantly over the years.

CATFISH

Mary de Blacam was born in Lansing, Michigan, USA. Her family later moved to Dublin, where she grew up. Mary is a graduate of the Mackintosh School of Art, Glasgow, she is now based in Dublin. Mary has exhibited at the following Dublin Galleries: Gormleys Fine Art, Leinster Gallery, The Origin Gallery, The Copper House Gallery, Steambox Studios and Locks Restaurant.

When I first saw the computer images of Pangur Ban Cat my immediate response was that this quirky statue would provide a unique opportunity to incorporate some stylised fish motifs which have frequently featured in my art practise. The name for the cat statue 'Catfish' quickly followed.

Before the real life 5 foot Pangur Ban's arrival into my home I was working solely from computerized images. I initially considered the option of a more muted olive green dark red and silver palette. However when Pangur landed on my doorstep I realised a wilder colour scheme was required.

'Catfish' is divided into 7 distinct elements. The green face. The stripy back of his head. Spots under his chin. Spots on his back. The fish motifs to the front. A crazy stripy tail and golden legs. Finally, I tracked down a poem written by WB Yeats featuring a cat called the 'Cat and the Moon'. A line from this poem was added to the Cat's right gold leg and 'Catfish' was finished off and born!









WHERE I SWIM

I decided to treat the model of Pangur Bán as a canvas for a full painting of an abstracted seascape. The location is the Guillameane swimming cove in Tramore, Waterford where I have been swimming from since I was a child. His head is the sky and I worked down through the cliffs, and sea to the diving platform and railings. On his tail there is a very feint red circle which represents the red painted outline of the brass compass that is on the changing platform of the cove. To honour Pangur Bán from "The Secret of Kells" movie I used the palette from the painting to give him a green and blue eye.

Sile is a self taught artist that lives with her husband and two boys in the South East of Ireland. After a hiatus from practice while her children were young she returned to art three years ago with the aim to build a career as a professional artist.

Sile set up a studio space at a room in her parents' house and began to build a body of work. The majority of her work is figurative and based around her family and the local community that gravitate towards the ocean. As an avid swimmer and surfer she is trying to capture the emotion or shared experience behind these activities rather than the physical action.

Her trajectory into the art world was immediate when she gained a place as a Heat Contestant in Sky Arts Portrait Artist of the year 2019. She has participated in two group shows in the Coastguard Station, Tramore, Waterford 2018/2019. She was invited to have a Solo Show at GOMA Gallery, Waterford 2019. Sile was an invited artist to show with Artforms' Annual Show 2019/2020. She also exhibited in the 139th RUA Exhibition 2020 and the piece was subsequently purchased by the N.I Finance Dept for their Art Collection.

This year Sile will be exhibiting in an online exhibition with Sasse Gallery in Los Angeles and having a Solo Show in a private galley in Barcelona. She is dividing her time between commissions and her own body of work as well as doing courses to enhance her practice in other areas such as print and oils.









STELLA

Stella (star) is an attempt to celebrate the power, energy and vulnerability of the night sky and nature generally. From the sunburst tail through the night sky body to the head you will find occasional moons and stars. The black and amber paws refer to Kilkenny's sporting life. If you're really observant you will discover a creature lurking within the head region!

Gerard Casey is a Kilkenny born Artist who works primarily from his studio near Bennettsbridge. He has studied art at Limerick and Cork College of Art and also at Ontario College of Art, Toronto, Canada.

His work is included in private and public collections both in Ireland and abroad. He has shown in all the major exhibitions in Ireland including EVA, Belltable, RHA, Boyle Arts Festival, Kilkenny Arts Festival, United Arts Club in Dublin and Belfast. His work has also been shown in the UK, Canada, Belgium, Italy and Germany.

Favourable reviews have occurred in the National Press / Radio over the years. Among his awards is the Douglas Hyde Gold Medal, awarded by the Arts Council... the only other recipient from Kilkenny being Tony O Malley, he believes. The Cork Arts Society Award and a number of Aer Lingus Travel Awards.

Whilst lecturing in Art on the BA (HONS) in Visual Art at WIT, Gerard was responsible for delivering the Art and Environment element of the course. This entailed siting temporary art works in non traditional Art locations, thus engaging with the public in a surprising, entertaining yet questioning way.

Kilkenny, with its historical and medieval character has nurtured the artist from a young age and he can often be found wandering about its streets and laneways enjoying whatever visual experiences are on offer. Indeed, he is often intrigued by the fact that on foreign holidays the locations he remembers most are often the ones that remind him of Kilkenny albeit a little warmer!









I OT 1

COPPER

CREATED BY: SATURIO ALONSO

Covering the surface of the Pangur Ban with a spiked metal layer creates, hopefully, an out of focus optical illusion and at the same time the piece is transformed into an oversized jewellery figure.

Born in Spain (1954) and a resident in Ireland, Saturio Alonso is a sculptor with a background as a painter and graphic designer.

Attracted by the puzzling and compelling relationships between technology and biology, Saturio Alonso uses a variety of prefabricated industrial materials, combined with more traditional ones, such as stone and wood, to create his sculptures. Very interested in the aesthetic content of religious art, and drawing from his Spanish background, at present is working in various projects involving the idea of power and propaganda. He is a founder member of Artcore, a mentor in KCAT, Callan and KINGSRIVER, Co. Kilkenny and his work can be found in various public spaces around Ireland and in private and public collections in Europe and America.









ALL TOGETHER NOW

My piece celebrates the nation emerging slowly from Covid-19 after 18 long months. Chris Judge is an illustrator, artist, and children's picture book author from Dublin, Ireland.

Since 2011 Chris has written and illustrated over 35 children's books, many of which are in collaboration with authors like Roddy Doyle, David O'Doherty and Eoin Colfer. His first book, The Lonely Beast won the Specsavers Irish Children's Book of the Year 2011 in the Bord Gáis Energy Irish Book Awards.

Chris also creates large-scale artworks, most notably three large mosaics in collaboration with Triskill Design for Stanhope Street School in Dublin, Scoil Bhride in Kildare and Mountrath CS.
